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RECREATION PARK SPEAKERS' STAND READY FOR USE

Walter Fleming, director of public service, made an official inspection of the speakers' stand in Recreation park yesterday and turned over the keys to the playground and recreation commission. While it probably will be used during the approaching holiday season it will not be dedicated until January 11, when the new clubhouse and other buildings under construction in the park will be formally turned over to the commission as a part of appropriate ceremonies. The speakers' stand was designed by G. W. Ferris of the city engineering department.

Construction of buildings and installation in Recreation park are being made under Mr. Fleming's supervision, and when completed will provide the facilities for large picnics. Tree planting and landscaping is being rushed under the direction of Peter Mohrbacker, superintendent of parks. The commission is pushing installation of playground apparatus so it will be ready for the dedication. Mr. Fleming stated yesterday that the keys to the new clubhouse will be turned over to the commission by January 1.
